

Ron Starbuck's poetry is a testament to the power of the human spirit and its ability to find compassion, energy and spirituality within people and the world. You do not need to be Christian or of any religious persuasion to understand and appreciate the music, earnest urge to understand and question God, or his adept use of metaphor and vivid imagery. I often return to his description of God's loneliness as the impetus behind the creation of the universe, a powerful idea that shows Ron's busting open dogma and expectations of spirituality. I return to his book and find new ideas to take in and think about, one of the best compliments a poet can receive.
